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COMPETITION VENUE

The 18th Asian Canoe Polo Championships will be held at **Marina Bay Waterfront Promenade** in Singapore.

Marina Bay is a vibrant and bustling freshwater waterfront area located in the heart of Singapore. The area is famous for its stunning architecture, iconic landmarks, and world-class attractions, making it one of the most popular tourist attractions in the city-state.

One of the most prominent features of Marina Bay is Marina Bay Sands. It has three towering hotel towers connected by a massive rooftop infinity pool, offering stunning panoramic views of the city skyline. The hotel also boasts a world-class casino, a shopping mall, and several high-end restaurants and bars.

An iconic attraction in Marina Bay is the Merlion statue, which stands at 8.6 metres tall. It is a mythical creature that has the head of a lion and the body of a fish. 



SCRUTINEERING SCHEDULE

Scrutineering of equipment will be done on 7 to 9 Nov 2023. Teams are able to get their equipment scrutineered during the free slots on 7 Nov, or during the official allocated time slots on 8 & 9 Nov.

There will be no penalties if the team fails scrutineering during the free slots. However, if the team fails scrutineering during their official scrutineering slots, penalties may apply (refer to detailed scrutineering guidelines in Appendix 2). If the team fails scrutineering during their official scrutineering slots, they may re-scrutineer again during the Recheck sessions on 9 Nov.

If there are any delays in game schedules (due to bad weather etc), the games may be rescheduled to another time slot / pitch to ensure that the games can be completed during the competition days.

SCRUTINEERING GUIDELINES

ACC CANOE POLO SCRUTINEERING GUIDE FOR ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS

ACC Scrutineering criteria will be based on ICF guidance as reference for all major ICF Canoe Polo events. As such, scrutineering of equipment will be a 3-step process.

STEP 1. COSMETIC CHECKS

- At the commencement of scrutineering, each team will present their equipment for checking. The whole team will have a visual check to ensure a high-quality uniform appearance of helmets, PFDs and kayaks.
 - Each failed item MAY be subject to a SGD70 fine (as determined by the event organizers). This fine must be paid before rechecking will occur before progressing to Step 2.
- For multiple cosmetic check failures, the whole team will lose their scrutineering time slot and will return for rechecking later. Rechecking will take place after all other teams have had their initial checks. If the re-scrutineering runs into the training time slots, training time slots will not be rescheduled.

STEP 2. SAFETY CHECKS

- All kayaks, paddles and helmets will be subjected to safety checks for sharp edges. Any failures will need to be rectified.
- PFDs will be subjected to padding thickness checks. PFDs will also be checked for number dimensions.
- Each player will be required to wear his or her helmet (with facemask). They will be checked for compliance with the article 16.9 and for helmet number size.
- The bumpers of EVERY kayak will be checked for condition they must be correctly attached in new or near-new condition and of the correct dimensions. Any failures will be required to be replaced.
- All paddles will be checked for edge thickness, corner radius (30mm) and sharp edges. Any failures will need to be rectified.
- Any issues identified on any piece of equipment will be clearly noted on the team check sheet and initialed by the scrutineer. These issues must be rectified in order to move to the next step.

STEP 3. TECHNICAL CHECKS

 Any kayak with an ICF label may be selected for a random check with full gauges for the technical specifications. Any kayak with an ICF label failing the technical specifications will be banned from use and the manufacturer will be asked to explain (Note: severe penalties apply).

Note: Due to wear and tear, bumpers are a safety issue and not a technical issue.

LIVE STREAMING & LIVE RESULTS

- There will be live streaming available for games in Pitch 1 games from 10-12 November.
- Links to the live stream and live results will be shared via the Official Telegram Channel during the event.

ACCOMMODATION

- Check-In at Changi CSC starts at 3.00PM, and guests are required to Check-Out by 10.30AM.
 - A refundable security deposit is required upon check-in (either by Cash or by Credit Card - Visa / Matercard only). Do note that Changi CSC only accepts Cash in SGD. There are money exchange counters available at Changi Airport if you need to convert other currencies to SGD.
- WIFI is available at each chalet in Changi CSC.
- No meals will be provided as part of the Accommodation booking.

FOOD & DRINKS

- Bananas provided by the Organizing Committee will be available at the Athlete's Rest Area from 8-12 November.
- Chilled Gatorade sponsored by Etika Pte Ltd (Official Distributor for Gatorade in Singapore) will be provided at the Athlete's Rest Area from 9-12 November.
- Lunch will be delivered to the Athlete's Rest Area for teams that have requested for Lunch from 10-12 November.
- For other meals, the Organizing Committee will be sharing some recommended food locations near the Accommodation and Competition Venue with the Team Leaders via the Telegram Channels.

TRANSPORT

- Daily shuttles between the Competition Venue (Marina Bay) and the Accommodation Venue (Changi CSC) will be provided for teams who have requested for transport.
 - Team Leaders can book the seats in advance or it would be on a first-come, first-served basis if the team did not make any seat bookings.
 More details will be provided to the teams during Accreditation.

OPENING, CLOSING AND MEDAL CEREMONIES

- Athletes should be in their official team attire or competition attire during the Opening, Closing and Medal Ceremonies.
- Covered footwear must be worn during the Ceremonies (barefoot, flip-flops and sandals are not allowed).
- Hats, headgears (except Hijab) and sunglasses are not allowed throughout the Ceremonies.


APPENDIX 2 - DETAILED SCRUTINEERING GUIDELINES

STEP 1. COSMETIC CHECKS

This step will ensure all items of equipment are uniform in colour and decals for each team.

Kayaks

- Kayak checks will ensure that any vinyl covering is of high quality, with limited wrinkles and creases, and will last the duration of the event. If vinyl covering is used, it must be uniform in colour, shade, and texture for the whole team.
- All kayaks must be of the same shade of colour, uniformed placement of logos, decal and kayak number above the join line.
 - Clear finish must be uniform in terms of weave.
 - Clear finish with Carbon weave is NOT considered to be the same as solid black.
- The number of the kayak can be placed inside the kayak and must be visible during scrutineering. The number of the kayak and the player tagged to it must be reported to the scrutineering team during the scrutineering check.
- An area (refer to image below) should be also reserved for the NF sticker.
- NOTE: SGD70 fine would apply per kayak for cosmetic failures



Example of Cosmetic Pass for Kayaks:



Examples of cosmetic failures for Kayaks:

- A. Creases of vinyl tape
 - o Vinyl must be smooth and to match the whole team
- B. Vinyl or tape coming off
 - Vinyl or tape must ensure a good professional look that lasts the whole event
- C. Different Logos and decals above the join line
- D. Kayaks not in uniform colour and shade





Helmets

- Helmets must be of a uniform solid base colour.
 - The practice of covering a helmet with strips sections of vinyl or tape is no longer acceptable.
- Helmet numbers must be the minimum size of 75mm high and be a clearly contrasting colour and font size to stand out from a distance.
- Helmet numbers must be cut from one piece of vinyl.
 - o Strips of tape or vinyl to create numbers is no longer acceptable.
- All stickers and logos must be identical in size, colour, and location.
 - Previous event scrutineering stickers must be removed.
- NOTE: SGD70 fine would apply per helmet for cosmetic failures

Example of Cosmetic Pass for Helmets:

All helmets have the same colour shade and texture. Logos are uniformly placed.





Examples of cosmetic failures for Helmets:

- A. Covering of screws or parts of helmet with tapes or vinyl
- B. Rusty or protruding parts
- C. Different colour and shades
- D. Different logos and decals placement



Body Protection / PFDs

- Body protection must be uniform in colour and appearance.
- Minimum number size:

Front: 100mmBack: 200mm

NOTE: SGD70 fine would apply per PFD for cosmetic failures

Example of Cosmetic Pass for PFDs:





Front Number - ≥ 100mm

Back Number - ≥ 200mm

Example of Cosmetic Failure for PFDs:

A. Size of Number does not meet requirement

STEP 2. SAFETY CHECKS

This step will check all equipment for points of safety.

Kayaks

- Will be tested for sharp edges, rough surfaces and padding attachment.
- Kayak padding must be in new or near-new condition and in one homogenous piece firmly attached to the kayak with no loose edges or ends as per the specifications. No tape, wrapping, extra foam or other substances may be used to increase the padding profile or to ensure correct attachment.
- Any padding failing Step 2 must be replaced with a new padding of the appropriate type to suit the kayak design to pass scrutineering.
- It is recommended that teams or individuals carry spare sets of padding for each design (Minor repairs can be completed during the event with tape or wrapping).

Examples of Safety Failures for Kayaks:

- A. Loose edges and missing parts of bumper
- B. Full tape wrap
- C. Loosely secured bumper
- D. Bumper did not meet minimum thickness requirement













Paddles

- Must have no sharp edges or loose tape.
 - Edging materials such as Kevlar tape must be correctly attached with no loose edges.
 - Electrical tape or equivalent are no longer acceptable to make paddles thicker or to cover sharp edges as it is too easily removed or comes off.
 - If the paddle edge is damaged, a more permanent solution such as Kevlar edging is required.
 - Epoxy repairs are still allowed but affected areas must be sanded to have smooth finish to touch.
- Edge thickness will be tested using the appropriate gauge.
 - When using the gauge, the paddle edge must not be able to enter the slot and touch the bottom to be considered as a pass. If a paddle is able to enter the slot and touch the bottom, it will be considered as a failure.



- Players may not apply any greasy substances to their equipment that change the frictional coefficient of the original surface.
 - Wax will only be allowed on the paddle shaft, at the areas that would be covered by the athlete's hand when paddling normally.


- A. Substance/ Wax on blades
- B. Tapes covering sharp edges
- C. Sharp edges and edging materials not attached





Helmets

- Each athlete must wear appropriate equipment, including a safety helmet with a strap attached to the chin underneath and a face mask.
- The helmet must be properly adjusted to provide maximum protection (from the base of the chin to the base of the skull see recommended coverage below).
 - The faceguard needs to be fitted so that a paddle cannot enter the gap between the face and faceguard when the head is tilted back.
 - Note the chin coverage in the image below.



- The grille must have a minimum distance of 10 mm from the athlete's nose.
- A gap of less than 5mm between the top of the faceguard and the helmet will be allowed. The 5mm can be measured using the paddle gauge.
- Helmet bolts must not stick out too far or be dangerous (rusty, bolt sticking out of nut etc).



Examples of Safety Failures for Helmets:

- A. Ill fitting facemask that does not cover the chin
- B. Back of helmet does not cover occipital bone







Body protection / PFDs

- The body protection in the form of a Personal Floatation Device (PFD) must meet or exceed the current ISO 12402-5:2020 and carry the appropriate label.
- The body protection must be at least 20mm thick.
- NOTE: This is a **NEW** specification to improve player safety (PFDs that previously passed scrutineering may have not met this new increased specification).





STEP 3. TECHNICAL CHECKS

This step will check the technical aspects of all equipment, in particular the kayaks.

Any kayak that fails any technical specifications will fail scrutineering, and will not be able to be used in the event.
